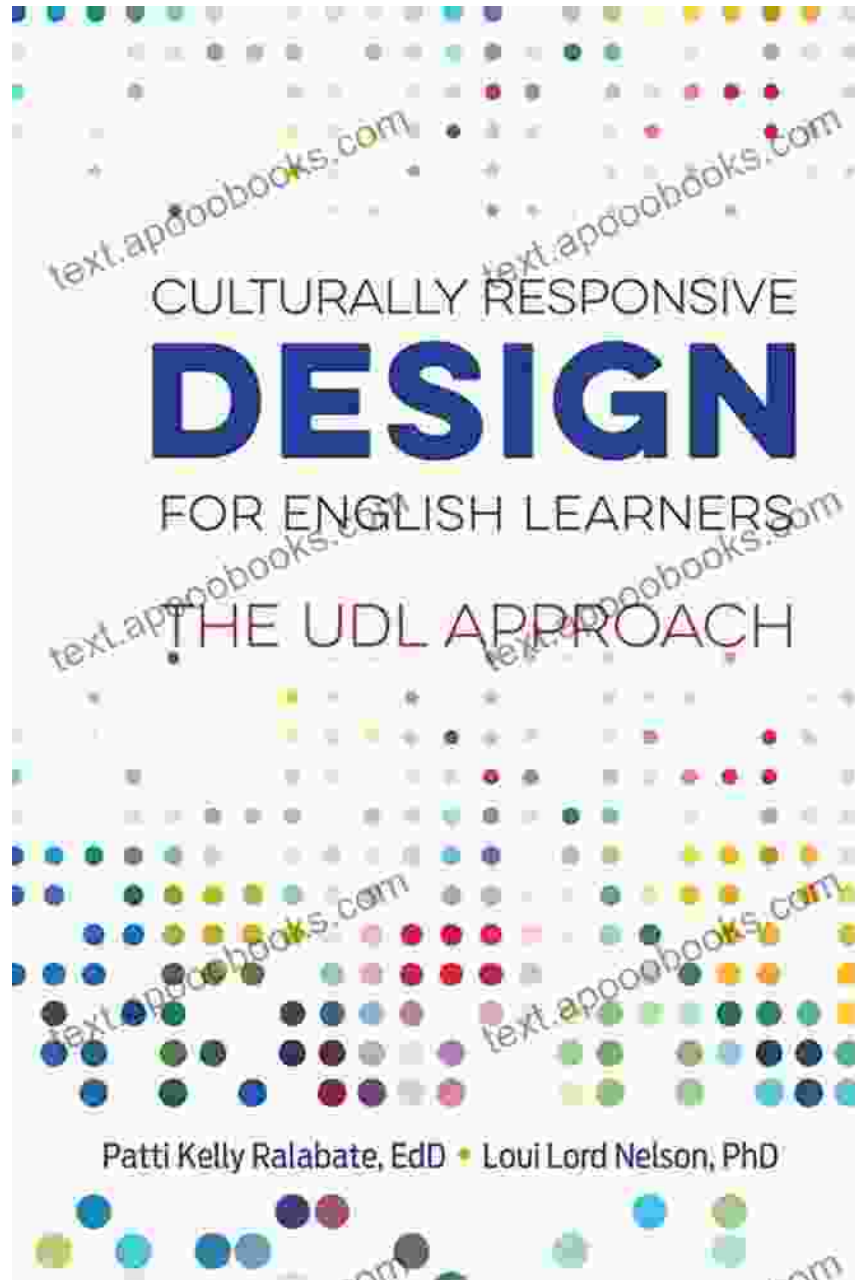


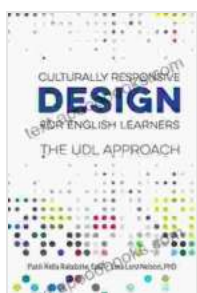

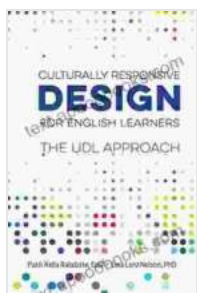
Dr. Guadalupe Valdés is a Professor of Education at Stanford University. Her research focuses on the social and cultural contexts of learning, and
